MANAGER'S REPORT

Cleanliness & Mowing

Even during drought conditions, it is important to maintain your property's exterior appearance. Algae, mildew, and other buildup can develop on fences and other exterior surfaces, and there are ways to safely clean these areas while being mindful of water conservation. Residents are responsible for keeping their fences clean and free of excessive algae or buildup.

Please remember that this includes both sides of the fence, even when the rear of the fence is less visible from your property. Residents of Roan Hills should also ensure that the area behind their fence is properly maintained and mowed. Keeping these areas neat and free of overgrown grass helps

maintain the community's overall appearance.

Thank you for doing your part to keep our community clean, attractive, and well-maintained while also being mindful of current drought conditions.

Hurricane Prep

As we move into the time of year when the Atlantic and Gulf waters heat up, the possibility of tropical storms and hurricanes increases. While we hope for a quiet season, preparation is always the best approach!

The HOA will work to keep residents informed and up to date with important weather information and community-related updates as they are received. In preparation for a significant storm, the HOA will also:

- Remove or secure potential flying objects in common areas.
- Ensure community gates are opened and properly secured, as needed.

- Remove and store pool furniture.
- Secure or remove park and playground equipment when necessary.

Residents also play an important role in storm preparation. Please take the time to inspect your property and ensure that outdoor furniture, decorations, trash cans, grills, toys, and other loose items are properly secured or brought inside for storage.

Playground equipment and trampolines should already be properly secured in accordance with the community's

specifications. However, if they are not, please make sure they are secured before a storm arrives. After all, your trampoline may be fun for your family – but it is not intended to become a free addition to your neighbor's backyard!

Taking a few minutes to prepare your property can help prevent damage and keep our community safer for everyone. The HOA will continue to share important updates as information becomes available.

DEVELOPER UPDATES

Construction Progress

Exciting progress is underway on the next chapter of Calesa Township! Crews have officially broken ground on the community's latest expansion, which will bring a new residential neighborhood and additional recreational opportunities for residents.

Construction has begun on a major new greenway connection located between the existing Sorrel Glen neighborhood and a future neighborhood.

Designed to enhance outdoor recreation and connectivity throughout Calesa Township, the greenway will feature a

dedicated trail system winding through a variety of park amenities, play equipment, and other outdoor recreational features.

As construction progresses, we look forward to sharing more updates on the new greenway as these exciting additions to Calesa Township begin to take shape.

SW 80th Avenue Expansion

Roadwork along SW 80th Avenue continues, with periodic late-night work near the intersection of SW 80th Street and SW 80th Avenue.

Crews are currently working north of SW 80th Street to create the transition needed to connect the new westerly lanes of SW 80th Avenue to the existing roadway. Residents may experience short-term traffic delays while this work is underway.

Once work on the westerly side is complete and traffic has been shifted into the new configuration, the contractor is expected to begin construction of the two lanes on the easterly side of SW 80th Avenue. Residents can expect a similar sequence of roadway construction as

work progresses along this portion of the project.

As always, please use extra caution when traveling through the construction zone. Follow posted speed limits, watch for workers and equipment, and allow additional travel time when necessary.

HORTICULTURE CORNER

In September, Florida's climate and bird activity change, so feeding can still be rewarding – but it requires careful planning to avoid spoilage, disease, and over-reliance on feeders.

Pros

1. Supporting resident and migratory birds: By September, many Florida residents are still active, and some

migratory species are passing through or settling in for the season. Feeding can help them build fat reserves before colder months.

2. Year-round feeding benefits: If you enjoy seeing birds and want to support them through the year, September feeding keeps your feeder routine going. It can also encourage birds to return in winter.
3. Variety of foods available: In September, you can offer fruits

(oranges, grapes, berries), suet, and seeds that birds eat year-round. This variety can attract more species.

4. Educational and observational value: Feeding provides opportunities to observe bird behavior, learn about species, and enjoy nature in your yard.

Cons

1. Spoilage risk: Florida's high humidity and occasional afternoon rains can cause seed to clump, mold, or ferment quickly. Loose fruit can attract ants, wasps, flies, and raccoons.
2. Disease transmission: Feeding in warm, humid weather increases the risk of birds spreading bacteria like Salmonella or E. coli through close contact at feeders.
3. Predation and collision hazards: Luring birds to the same spot can make them more vulnerable to cats, hawks, and window collisions.

4. Over-reliance on feeders: If feeders are left up too long, birds may become dependent, reducing their foraging skills and making them less adaptable to food shortages.
5. Heat and suet issues: Suet can soften, go rancid, or stick to birds' plumage in high heat, especially if not stored properly.

Best Practices

Use heat- and humidity-resistant foods: Black oil sunflower seed, safflower, white proso millet, shelled peanuts, oranges, grapes, mealworms, and heat-safe suet.

- Keep feeders in shade and clean them daily or after rain.
- Offer only what birds finish quickly to reduce spoilage.
- Provide fresh water daily, with extra rinsing in peak heat.
- Consider suet feeders but remove them if suet goes rancid.
- Monitor for pests and remove spoiled food promptly.

So, is it safe to drive a golf cart on the street? Yes — when everyone follows the rules.

The real question is not whether the roads are safe. The real question is whether each driver is doing their part to keep them safe. Before blaming others, each of us should take a moment to look at our own driving habits and make sure we are helping protect our community.

FINDING ZEN

On Tuesday, Sept. 15, and Wednesday, Sept. 16, nonprofits throughout Marion County will come together for Give4Marion, our community's annual giving campaign. This year, I hope you will consider supporting Sholom Park.

More than 20 years ago, Sholom Park opened with a purpose that still guides us today: to provide a place where people could find peace, enjoy nature, learn, reflect, and step away from the pressures of everyday life for a while. Sidney

and Ina Colen envisioned the park as a gift to the community.

Much has changed around Sholom Park since 2004. Marion County has grown tremendously, new neighborhoods and businesses continue to appear, and life seems to move a little faster every year. Yet inside the park, we work very hard to preserve something that should not change.

People come here to walk beneath the trees, sit beside the water, exercise, take photographs, attend programs, spend time with their families, or simply find a quiet place to think. Based on our vehicle counts, we estimate that

120,000 to 150,000 people visit Sholom Park each year.

And every one of them can enter without paying an admission fee.

That is an important part of what Sholom Park is. We want the park to remain a place anyone can enjoy, regardless of whether they can afford a ticket or membership. Sholom Park receives no tax revenue and is not supported through homeowner's association fees. Caring for the gardens, trees, trails, ponds, and facilities – and continuing to improve and protect the park – requires substantial resources and year-round attention.

MAINTENANCE TIPS

Florida summers are tough on A/C systems! With the heat, humidity, and long run times, your A/C is working hard to keep your home comfortable. A few simple maintenance steps can help your system run efficiently and prevent avoidable issues:

- Change your air filter regularly: A dirty filter restricts airflow and makes your A/C work harder. Check your filter monthly and replace it as needed.
- Keep your condensate drain line clear: Your A/C removes humidity from the air, and that moisture drains through the condensate line. Over time, algae and buildup can restrict the line, causing water to back up. Periodically checking and

maintaining the condensate drain line can help prevent clogs and potential water damage.

- Keep the area around your outdoor unit clear: Make sure grass, weeds, landscaping, or other items aren't blocking airflow around the condenser.
- Keep doors and windows closed while the A/C is running: This helps keep the cool air inside and the hot, humid Florida air outside.
- Check your vents: Make sure furniture, rugs, or other items don't block supply and return vents.
- Don't be alarmed by longer run times: During periods of extreme heat, it is normal for your A/C to run for extended periods as it works to maintain the temperature inside your home.

- Pay attention to unusual changes: If you notice warm air coming from the vents, unusual noises, water around the indoor unit, or the system struggling to maintain temperature, don't wait to address it.

Your A/C system not only cools your home – but it also removes humidity. Keeping the system properly maintained helps it do both jobs effectively. A clogged condensate line can cause the system to shut down or cause water to back up around the indoor unit, so this is an important part of routine A/C maintenance. A little routine maintenance goes a long way – especially during a Florida summer! Taking a few minutes to check your filter, keep your equipment clear, and make sure your condensate drain is flowing properly can help keep your home cool, comfortable, and protected.
